HA-1171 MC COMBS HOUSE Havre de Grace, Md. c. 1880's

Built in the late 19th century in the style of a Gothic cottage, the McCombs House also displays Eastlake trim on the porch and entrance. The main section of the house is under a gambreled roof, but a prominent two story gable addition with a bargeboard projects from the center of the front elevation.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

120 S. Whion Avenue: is a two story, approximately four bay wide dwelling located on the corner of S. Union Ave. and Bourbon St., facing east. Believed to have been built c. 1880, in the style of a Gothic Revival Cottage the house has Eastlake trim. The main section is under a gambrel roof, but a prominenent two and a half story gable addition projects from the center of the front elevation, the focal point of the house. In addition, two wings with second story porches join the gable ends of the main section. The house is owned by a doctor who has his office on the first floor. It is covered with clapboards and painted white with green trim.

The front elevation has a one bay gabled entrance portico, north of the advanced center section, with pairs of bracketed turned posts, similar to those on the front elevation portico. Conforming to the polygonal shape of the wing (now a garage) on the north elevation is a pentagonal second story porch with a scalloped wood shingled roof. The roof is supported by turned posts which are framed by perforated brackets, and a low spindle balustrade. An additional decorative bracket is in the center of each porch bay.

Most of the windows have 2/2 light double-hung sash with recessed lintels, having a bead at the top, and plain wooden sills. A three-part 2/2 light window consisting of one large window flanked by two smaller ones, is on the second story front elevation, center addition. W indows with pointed arches are in all the attic gables, one on the front and two at the sides. Front elevation windows have half panel-half louvered shutters on the first floor and louvered shutters on the decond floor.

The main entrance is north of the center of the front elevation. It has a six-panel door with a four light transom above it, the ends of the transom frame being curved. In the center of the southelevation of the wing is a multi-light door with a ten-light transom above it. French doors framed by louvered shutters, are found in the rear of the north wing.

The house is covered by a slate gambrel roof with the ridge running north to south and has a steeply ponted slate galle roof on the advanced center addition; a brick center chimney is found on the gambrel roof.

A polychrome slate tile walk leads to the main entrance, and a patio of the same material is found at the rear. There are no outbuildings of note.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

A.P. Mc Combs, for whom this house was built, was the owner of the Havre de Grace Iron Works, which he bought in 1866, the Havre Republican, established in 1868 and in 1905 he was president of the First National Bank (HA-1113). Believed to have been built in the 1880's, the McCombs House is one of the most substantial yet picturesque frame dwellings in Havre de Grace. The roof line on the main section is particularly unusual in that it combines a gambrel with an advanced gable, having an ornamental bargeboard on it. The house appears to have been altered on the exterior and interior, and the 1899 Sanborn Insurance Map shows it with a veranda across the entire front, now removed. Unlike many of the houses in Havre de Grace used for professional purposes, this house has retained its residential appearance.

Union Ave. runs north to south with the Chesapeake Bay at it's southern end. Wide and tree shaded, the street has many architecturally significant buildings of differnt styles on it; it is the town's most impressive street visually. The northern and middle parts of avenue are particularly rich in 19th and early 20th century architecture. Whereas, at the southern end (between the hospital and the Bay) most of the houses, interspersed with MD's offices are new.
